Tuesday 6 April - The Poetry of Sylvia Townsend Warner

Described as witty and original, the work of Sylvia Townsend Warner has been having a revival in recent years. Although known primarily as a writer of novels and short stories, her poetry also attracted a lot of attention. Her first book of poetry was published in 1925 and was followed by three more collections over the years. She became a committed Communist in the 1930's and lived for many years with her partner Valentine Ackland near Maiden Newton in Dorset. She died on 1 May 1978, aged eighty-four.

Tuesday 25 May - Rohan McCullough

Rohan McCullough began her acting career in the original cast of the musical *Hair* and Jean-Louis Barrault's *Rabelais*. Her film appearances include Derek Jarman's *War Requiem* and David Hare's *Strapless*. She has given poetry recitals with Sir Derek Jacobi, Edward Fox, and John Julius Norwich and she regularly appeared with the late Sir John Mortimer in his poetry and prose entertainment, *Mortimer's Miscellany*. She has performed as narrator with leading American symphony orchestras, including the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl and The Boston Symphony at Carnegie Hall. Rohan comes to East Coker bringing her blend of poetry and prose that has delighted audiences throughout the world.



EAST COKER OIL - PURCHASE SCHEME

I've had this really good idea! The oil suppliers' tankers are forever rushing from place to place using valuable fuel and time. Why not make life easier and cheaper for them by co-ordinating our orders so that a trip to East Coker is really worth-while? They might even give us a discount.

Well we've actually been doing it for the last year and it's worked pretty well. We've saved between 2p a litre and nearly 4p. Multiply that by 1000 litres – looks like £20 to £40 to me. And don't forget that if you have less than 1000 litres you'll be paying the same price and saving more per litre.

Before you ask, I just do the donkey-work, collecting the requirements, ringing round the suppliers and placing the order and you pay the supplier directly. I aim to do four orders per year on a quarterly basis in January, April, July and October and I have been advised that July is the time for the best price.

If you have already taken part and found it worthwhile, encourage your friends and neighbours to join in. The more we can order, the better the price. As the participants know, it all went pear-shaped in January with the bad weather and panic-buying, but in the end those who could wait got a very good price for a February delivery.

NOTES FROM THE OBSERVATORY

Vernal Equinox 20 March 2010

What a long cold winter it has been. After a mild autumn, winter began abruptly on 1 December and lasted until early March, almost as long as the severe winter of 1962/63. A blocking high pressure system remained over the land drawing in very cold air from the Continent and from the Arctic. It was not until early March that the high was replaced by blessed Atlantic weather which lifted our daily temperatures. The only redeeming feature of the long winter has been a fairly dry period throughout.

Rainfall this year has been 152mm (5.99ins) but we have had 27 frosty mornings.

The lowest overnight temperature fell to minus 7.1C (19.2F) on 8 January while it froze all day on the two days of 7 and 8 January

The village did not have the heavy snowfalls that disrupted traffic further west and elsewhere in the country.

The long cold winter has put the flowering of our spring plants back by some three weeks. I have not yet seen the usual Spring plants in flower, such as celandines and primroses yet snowdrops and crocuses were hardly affected. Daffodils are very late this year. Hazel catkins appeared in mid March. Jew's Ear fungus, easily recognisable, was surprisingly reported growing on a Buddleia; the elder is the usual host.

Frog spawn has appeared in my garden pond so the cycle of life continues.

I received an interesting report of a Red-legged Partridge (a continental variety) spotted in shrubbery at Wraxhill Road in early February, while many starlings were seen performing their intricate aerial displays and patterns near ASDA

A report that 'Spring is on the way' proceeded a sighting of two brimstones while a small tortoiseshell has been seen flying in March.

Despite the cold winter, the usual nondescript winter moths have been flying throughout the cold. I saw the first bumble bee flying on a sunny warm day on 18 March.

Saturn will soon appear in the southern night sky as Mars moves away to the west.

EAST COKER PARISH COUNCIL

Pupils at East Coker School have been issued with hi-visibility jackets to highlight their walk to the school. Thanks to District & County Councillor, Cathy Bakewell for her support for this.

A small team of Parish Councillors has been set up as a working committee to attend relevant meetings in order to monitor **future planning issues** which may adversely affect East Coker parish. This mostly applies to the mandate for the expansion of Yeovil.

South Somerset District Council will no longer be directly in control of **Rights of Way** maintenance in its area after 1 April 2010. The local team has been very supportive, responding promptly to repairs and problems. Responsibility will pass back to the County Council, who are currently reviewing the structure of the Rights of Way service and formulating a plan of how this will be run from April onwards.

Meanwhile they have also expanded their **Handyman Service**, which has been set up to help residents who are unable to carry out essential household tasks.

Their **'Love Food**, **Hate Waste'** Campaign has been set up to encourage people to make a pledge to reduce their food waste – **only buy what you need**.

They are also now able to offer all households a **Garden Waste Collection Service.** Special Wheelie Bin (PUT YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS ON IT!) costs £60 and you are then registered for a fortnightly collection. They also have bundles of garden waste sacks at £15 for 10 sacks. Contact Brympton Way on 462462.

In response to the ever increasing number of complaints about dogs fouling pavements, verges and amenity areas, South Somerset District Council has issued a new leaflet to local dog owners:

Dog Owners' Guide to Keeping Our Towns & Villages Clean.

- Give your dog plenty of exercise, but keep it under control. You are legally responsible for your dog's conduct.
- ALWAYS clean up after your dog. Failure to do so may lead to a fine of up to £1000.
- Train your dog to use your own garden, if at all possible.
- In the interests of public health, do not allow your dog onto sports' fields and pitches.
- Your dog **MUST** wear a tag bearing your name and address. Tags are available from the Council, pet shops and vets.
- If you allow children to exercise your dogs, they must be competent, and be responsible for the dog's behaviour.
- The Enforcement Officers actively seize dogs which are unattended in public areas. These are taken to the Council's Kennelling Facility and are only released on payment of the prescribed charges.
- Children can contract diseases such as toxocariasis and salmonella from dogs' mess. Ensure that your dog is wormed regularly.

Enforcement Officers are promoting responsible dog ownership throughout South Somerset. They work closely with Parish and Town Councils to identify and target problem areas. For further information contact your local Enforcement Officer on 462462.


